### **REMEMBERING DR. JAMES LAIDLAW** SANDRA BOSLEY



PHW is saddened to report the passing of one of our longtime supporters and Honorary Council member, Jim Laidlaw. Among his community involvements, he served Board President for Preservation of Historic as Winchester from 1974-1976, and President of the Board of the Museum of the Shenandoah Valley from 2003-2005.

Jim was an accomplished pianist, and my first encounter

with him was through the Holiday House Tour. He played plano during the 2005 tour at the DeBerghs' home on South Washington Street. He played, calm and soothing, while I fumbled my way through reading a script at the last moment. This pattern repeated through the years, when he was called on to lend thoughts and guidance to PHW in his capacity as an honorary director. That approach was a common refrain in Jim's life calm, patient, levelheaded, and always willing to help.

# PHW'S 57TH ANNUAL MEETING

PHW held its first true in-person event in over a year for its 57th Annual Meeting. While the forecast had called for pleasant weather, a very localized downpour also came to visit the outdoor gathering. We persevered, however, and were able to recognize two years of preservation projects for 2020 and 2021. Read on to see who was recognized!

#### Awards of Merit:

These awards recognize renovations of houses or buildings that contribute to improving the character of their neighborhoods and maintaining the overall historic fabric of the city. In order of nomination:

• Nancy Murphy, 126 West Leicester Street

The circa 1870 frame house had many years of neglect and patchwork repairs from the foundation to the roof. While the exterior retains its historic appearance, interior has been reworked into a more modern form.

• Stephen Von Fange, 501-507 North Cameron Street

A former gas station and adjoining house were renovated in a modern style just outside of Winchester's Historic District.

• Karen Darby, 417 Fairmont Avenue A circa 1885 T-shaped Italianate home had been covered in pebbledash. The new owner removed it and restored the exterior, finding other historic tidbits hidden under the siding along the way.

• **Betty Laws, 416 South Cameron Street** This log Federal-style building with Italianate details ca. 1810 received new siding and windows to extend its life and add beauty.

# • Stephen P. Williams, 212 North Kent Street

A ca. 1900 Italianate house that had been damaged by fire and boarded up for many years has now been restored and looks better than its condition pre-fire.

#### • GinTon, LLC, Henkel House, 316 West Boscawen Street

The Henkel House was in need of work after being vacant for a number of years. After this TLC, the home can continue to function as a viable historic building meeting the needs of modern tenants.

• Beverley Byrd, 312 West Boscawen Street This project is the type where not much about the house changes from the street, but the work to the interior and rear of the building will help it continue to be a useful residence in Winchester.

• David E. Mitchell, 123 East Cork Street This careful restoration focused on the porch and foundation of an early 1800s brick home. The painstaking attention to detail and matching materials is stellar.

• The Clowser Foundation, Clowser Family Cemetery, 152 Tomahawk Trail

Thanks to the use of ground penetrating radar, the Clowser Foundation confirmed 16 burials in 15 plots, settling the debate on whether the fenced area was the historic cemetery. As a bonus, the headstones were also located using the same method.

• Scott Bessette, Philip Williams House, 25 West Piccadilly Street

This historic tax credit project took a sensitive approach in restoring the historic home for an event center. (Cont. next page)

## HOLIDAY HOUSE TOUR 2021

PHW is currently in the process of securing homes for the 2021 tour. Of the three secured to date, we are thrilled to be able to share that none have been open for the Holiday House Tour before. We hope to have the full house lineup ready to announce on our website in September. We will be reaching out to past sponsors soon, but a form is enclosed if you would like to advertise in the tour booklet.

Be sure to mark your calendars now for the tour on December 5, between noon and 4 PM. Tickets may be limited this year or some other safety measures may need to be in place, so keep an eye on our website www.phwi.org for the latest information.

Likewise, planning is underway for the Bough & Dough Shop, to be held at the Hexagon House again. Many favorite artists are lined up for the shop, which is tentatively scheduled for November 15-December 5 to coincide with advance ticket sales for the house tour. #### **Belchic Award:**

This award is named in honor of Ben Belchic, a founding member of PHW. Ben Belchic was also an active member of the Winchester-Frederick County Historical Society, so the Belchic award recognizes a significant contribution to understanding Winchester's history.

This year we were proud to recognize the work of Mike Robinson, who has been bringing Winchester's history to a wider audience through his <u>Facebook page</u> <u>Winchester Tales</u>, subsequently expanded into a five-volume set of books with more on the way.

#### Patron's Award:

This award recognizes a person or business which has been an outstanding supporter of the goals and programs of PHW. This award usually recognizes a financial component.

This year, we were honored to recognize Margaretta Barton Colt, who has long been a supporter of the history and architecture of Winchester. Her involvement with PHW started in our Kurtz Cultural Center days during the publication of <u>Defend the Valley</u>, for which she commissioned the painting "Winchester & Frederick County, Virginia" by Page Huff Dillon. That may sound familiar, as the painting has reentered our day to day lives again through the <u>Shenandoah Valley</u> <u>Tapestry Project</u>, which recreated the painting in needlework.
