



## **Architectural Description**



**Secondary Resource Summary:** A shed is located south of the dwelling.



A two-story ell is located on the southwest corner of the rear (south) elevation, Two bays deep, the ell is original to the main block but according to the 1885 Sanborn Fire Insurance ma; the ell was originally one story in height. By 1891, the ell was noted as being two stories on the Sanborn map. The wood-frame ell is clad with wood weatherboard siding and has a front-gabled roof covered with standing-seam metal. The window openings contain 6/6, double-hung, vinyl-sash windows.

A two-story addition is located on the southeast corner of the rear elevation and was constructed circa 1900. This addition has the same material treatment as the main block and has a shed roof covered with standing-seam metal. A one-story addition is located on the rear of the first addition and has a shed roof. This addition could not be surveyed from the public right-of-way.

**Secondary Resource Description:** A one-story shed is located south of the dwelling and was constructed circa 1930. The shed is wood-frame construction and is covered with bricktex siding. A front-gabled roof of standing-seam metal caps the shed. A single-leaf, wood door provides entry into the shed on the north elevation.

**Significance Statement:** This single dwelling is representative of the domestic architecture constructed in the City of Winchester in the early nineteenth century. Based on the form, fenestation pattern, massing, and modest original style, the dwelling can be given a circa 1840 date of construction. The dwelling retains significant integrity of materials, workmanship, and design, despite the application of late-nineteenth-century stylized ornamentation. Further, integrity of location and setting has not been compromised. All of these aspects contribute to integrity of feeling and association. This dwelling qualifies under Criteria A and C as a contributing resource in the Winchester Historic District.
